

**CCL UK** 2023







Creative Climate Leadership (CCL) is a transformative programme for artists and cultural professionals to explore the cultural dimensions of climate change, and take action with impact, creativity and resilience. The five-day intensive course enables participants to take a deep dive into understanding the historic, social and creative dimensions of the climate movement and explore what leadership means in the context of a rapidly changing world.

Creative Climate Leadership UK 2023 took place in Hawkwood, Gloucestershire from 6 - 10 March. The programme brought together 24 participants with a rich knowledge and lived experiences in areas as varied as music, performing arts, activism, AI, theatre, science communications, museums, radio, journalism, and cultural policy. Together, they are a powerful network of change-makers with creativity, skills, and vision, emerging ready to continue sowing seeds for transformation across the wider arts and culture sector.



## What is the Creative Climate Leadership Programme?

CCL is an international training and transformation programme to empower artists and cultural professionals to take action on the climate and ecological crisis with impact, creativity, and resilience.

The programme strengthens the extraordinary climate leadership found across the creative and cultural ecosystem, and champions positive changes using an approach orientated towards justice and inclusion. Each iteration of the course is infused with the entrepreneurial ideas of CCL alumni.

250 people, working in over 30 countries, have taken part in CCL programmes so far. Our alumni join an evolving international network of creatives taking action and mobilising others in their field, through events, workshops, artistic works, and projects.

About the Creative Climate Leadership UK Programme:

CCL UK was funded by Arts Council England and was held at Hawkwood College from 6 – 10 March 2023. Hawkwood is a sustainably run estate in the Cotswolds, that embodies the intersections between arts and culture and environmental sustainability. The appetite to participate in the CCL Programme has grown continually since it first launched, with over 100 high calibre applications submitted for the UK iteration of the programme.
